

ANDREW MCLEOD

A selection of paintings by prolific New Zealand artist Andrew McLeod: painter, digital artist and printmaker. McLeod is a serious artist. Not without humour – he's 'the real deal'. His pervasive art practice comprises years of image making, delivering both a mastery of technique influenced by art history greats and a command of a visual language that he applies skilfully to a contemporary and continuous visual commentary.

"…a painter of visions and wonders drawn from imagination, art history and autobiography". McLeod renders a private world, real and imagined.

How prolific an artist? Andrew is constantly drawing from which he has produced numerous publications offering an accessible way of collating and sharing his moment-bymoment reflections of consciousness. This is something that we can all relate to; '...It's good to do the design stuff because it's a common language'. For those of us who may be overwhelmed by the grand scale and beauty of his large painted works, we may find a familiar entry point into understanding the content through the fluid, momentary style of his print work.

Andrew's diverse interests and the autobiographical nature of his practice help form the authenticity of his work. As well as visiting Siberia to learn throat singing, he designs textiles and jewellery. He shares a love for music with his partner Liz Maw; their duo, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome; and band, Evil Ocean.

Andrew is connected to the Eastern Bay of Plenty through his parents, John and Kay McLeod, who live in Ōpōtiki; and his grandfather, Dave White, who was a founder of the original Museum on Boon Street, opened in 1972.
